Systemic reform is necessary, not only in Ferguson, Missouri, but nationwide. To serve and protect is not a suggestion; it is a mandate that law enforcement must apply equally to all communities. Otherwise, there will only be more Fergusons. Sen. Ben Cardin and Rep. John Conyers are national leaders who have introduced legislation to ban racial profiling, the End Racial Profiling Act, [S.1038/H.R.2851](#). A panel of experts from the civil and human rights community, law enforcement, and academia will explore ways to end profiling practice, including passing the End Racial Profiling Act and calling on the Department of Justice to issue revised guidance on the use of race by law enforcement.
