Profiling—which occurs when law enforcement authorities target particular individuals based not on their behavior, but rather on the basis of personal characteristics, such as their race, ethnicity, national origin, sexual orientation or religion—is an unjust and ineffective method of law enforcement that makes us less, not more, safe and secure. The practice is pervasive and used by law enforcement authorities at the federal, state, and local levels.

The U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) should revise its June 2003 *Guidance Regarding the Use of Race by Federal Law Enforcement Agencies* to clarify ambiguities, close loopholes, and eliminate provisions that allow for any form of profiling. Congress should also pass the End Racial Profiling Act (S.1038/H.R. 2851).

On Wednesday, May 28, at 3pm, 2456 RHOB, civil rights leaders will provide background on the profiling guidance and suggest ways policymakers can be helpful in making the guidance effective. The briefing will include a Q&A as well as provide a call to action.
