#### LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE ISSUES VOTING RECORD FOR 100TH CONGRESS

-- LCCR Applauds The 100th Congress For One Of The Most Successful And Productive Civil Rights Congresses In Our Nation's History

WASHINGTON, D.C., OCTOBER 27--The Leadership Conference on Civil Rights, a coalition of 180 national organizations representing minorities, women, disabled persons, labor, religious groups, and older Americans, seeking to advance civil rights through enactment and enforcement of federal legislation, released today its Voting Record for the 100th Congress.

The biennial report card reflects the coalition's concerns for civil rights and social justice legislation. Among the issues included in the current Voting Record are the Robert Bork Supreme Court nomination, the Civil Rights Restoration Act, the Fair Housing Amendments Act of 1988, the Japanese-American Redress Act, the immigration legalization program, pay equity, disability rights, programs for low-income children & families, the Racial Justice Act, minimum wage legislation, the Hate Crimes Statistics Act and the Parental and Medical Leave Act.

In releasing the report, Ralph G. Neas, Executive Director of the Conference, stated that "while the Reagan Administration continued to compile the worst civil rights record of any administration in several decades, the 100th Congress established a remarkably good record on civil rights. Indeed, the 100th Congress was one of the most successful and productive Congresses in our Nation's history. Although there were a couple of disappointments, the bipartisan congressional majority on civil rights passed a number of significant and historic measures and, just as important, once again prevented the Radical Right from enacting any major items on its civil rights legislative agenda."

Fourteen Senators and 106 Representatives compiled a perfect voting record while 3 Senators and 17 Representatives voted against the Conference position on every key voted tabulated. Comparison figures for the 99th Congress show that 14 Senators and 107 Representatives scored 100 percent, while 11 Senators and 57 Representatives compiled zero ratings.

We note that this Voting Record indicates that Senator Dan Quayle has a rating of 15 and Senator Lloyd Bentsen had a rating of 69.

#### Full Text of the Statement by Ralph G. Neas

The 100th Congress was one of the most successful and productive Congresses in our Nation's history. Four congressional accomplishments merit special attention:

- -- The defeat of the Robert Bork Supreme Court nomination;
- -- The enactment of the Fair Housing Amendments Act of 1988, the most significant and dramatic improvement in civil rights law in the past two decades. This historic measure provides a strong and effective enforcement mechanism for the Fair Housing Act and extends coverage of the Act to disabled persons and to families with children. This is the first time a civil rights law has provided coverage to persons with disabilities outside of federally assisted programs and the first time ever that families with children have been covered by federal civil rights law;
- -- The enactment, over President Reagan's veto, of the Civil Rights
  Restoration Act. This legislation overturns the <u>Grove City</u> Supreme
  Court decision and prohibits the federal funding of discrimination
  against minorities, women, disabled persons, and older Americans; and
- -- The enactment of the Japanese-American Redress Act. This long overdue legislation apologizes to Japanese-Americans interned during World War II and authorizes payments of \$20,000 to surviving internees.

In addition to these achievements, the Congress in overwhelming bipartisan agreement funded the Legal Services Corporation and once again repudiated the reconstituted and discredited Civil Rights Commission by reducing substantially its appropriations and earmarking how those funds could be spent. Also, the House of Representatives passed the Pay Equity Bill, the Hate-Crimes Statistics Act, and a House resolution protecting House employees from job discrimination. And it should be noted that 66 Senators and 145 House members signed a friend of the court brief asking the Supreme Court not to reverse the 1976 Runyon decision which prohibits intentional racial discrimination in the making and enforcing of private contracts.

One major disappointment of the 100th Congress was the failure of the House and the Senate to pass key items on the "family agenda." However, a solid foundation has been laid for the 101st Congress, and there is no question that family issues like the Family and Medical Leave Act and child care legislation will rank high on next year's civil rights agenda.

Overall, Congress has compiled a very good civil rights record during the Reagan presidency. Indeed, the past eight years have been a bipartisan reaffirmation of civil rights and a bipartisan rejection of the extremism of the Reagan Administration. In addition to the accomplishments of the 100th Congress, some of the successes of the 97th, 98th, & 99th Congresses should be mentioned: the 1982 Voting Rights Act Extension, the Martin Luther King Holiday Bill, the two laws on South African Sanctions,

improvement in the Age Discrimination in Employment Claims Assistance Act, three laws overturning Supreme Court decisions which had weakened disability statutes, enactment of major sections of the Economic Equity Act, the Voting Accessibility for Disabled and Senior Citizens Act, the defeat of the William Bradford Reynolds' nomination to be Associate Attorney General, the effort to preserve the Executive Order on Affirmative Action, and the defeat of legislation to strip the Federal Courts of Jurisdiction over certain constitutional issues.

As successful as the legislative campaigns have been over the past eight years, an inordinate amount of time, effort, and resources have been devoted to refighting civil rights battles that were won in the 1960's and 1970's. Consequently, while the accomplishments of the past several decades have been preserved and a number of important initiatives have been enacted, the unfinished agenda of the civil rights movement, economic justice, has largely been ignored. And that has been a profound tragedy. Hopefully, there will be a less confrontational atmosphere between the branches of government in the coming years and we will be able to address more comprehensively the problems of poverty that plague our Mation.

Absent a tipping of the ideological balance of the Supreme Court, I am confident that we will continue to move forward with the civil rights agenda. Ironically, the lasting legacy of Edwin Meese and William Bradford Reynolds may be that they served as a catalyst for the reaffirmation of our Nation's bipartisan commitment to equal opportunity for all our citizens.

Confirmation of President Reagan's nomination of Robert H. Bork to be an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court. Rejected 42-58 on October 23, 1987.

### 2. Civil Rights Restoration Act

Hatch amendment to narrow coverage of four civil rights acts -- Title VI, Title IX, Sec. 504, Age Discrimination Act. The amendment would apply each law's ban on discrimination to only the portion of a religious institution receiving federal aid. Rejected 36-56 on January 27, 1988.

#### 3. Civil Rights Restoration Act

Hatch amendment to broaden the 'religious tenets' exemption under Title IX to cover institutions that are "closely identified with the tenets of a religious organization". Rejected 39-56 on January 28, 1988.

Danforth amendment to ensure that the CRRA does not require persons or public or private entities receiving federal funds to perform or pay for abortions. Agreed to 56-39 on January 28, 1988

Hatch substitute amendment to provide institution-wide coverage under the four civil rights laws only for educational institutions. Rejected 19-75 on January 28, 1988.

Final passage of the Civil Rights Restoration Act to restore broad coverage of four civil rights laws -- Title VI, Title IX, Sec. 504 and the Age Discrimination Act. CRRA prohibits federal funding of discrimination against minorities, women, disabled persons and older Americans. Passed 75-14 on January 28, 1988. (A two-thirds vote is needed to override a veto.)

#### 7. Civil Rights Restoration Act

Override of the President's veto of the Civil Rights Restoration Act. Passed 73-24 on March 22, 1988.

Byrd motion to end debate on an amendment to the Immigration and Nationality Act to extend the application period for the general legalization program established by the 1986 immigration law amendments. Rejected 40-56 on April 28, 1988. (60 votes needed for cloture)

#### 9. Japanese-American Redress Act

Stevens motion to table an amendment to remove the authorization of payments to Japanese-Americans interned during World War II. Agreed to 67-30 on April 20, 1988.

Matsunaga motion to table an amendment to provide that no funds be appropriated in any year in which there is a federal deficit. Agreed to 61-35 on April 20, 1988.

Final passage of bill to apologize to Japanese-Americans interned during World War II and to authorize payments of \$20,000 to surviving internees. Passed 69-27 on April 20, 1988.

Passage of Budget Resolution for FY 1988 providing for increases in selected programs for low-income children and families. Passed 56-42 on May 6, 1987.

Final passage of amendments to Title VIII, the Fair Housing Act, to strengthen enforcement and to add disabled persons and families with children to the protected classes. Passed 94-3 on August 2, 1988.

Kennedy motion to end debate on the bill to raise the minimum wage to \$4.55 an hour over three years from the present \$3.35. Motion rejected 56-35 on September 23, 1988. (60 votes needed for cloture)

Kennedy amendment to the Drug Bill to restrict the imposition of the death penalty when applied in a racially discriminatory manner. Rejected 35-52 on October 13, 1988.

Byrd motion to table a motion to postpone consideration of the PMLA which would require employers to provide unpaid job protected leave to parents of newborn or sick children and for an employee's own serious illness. Agreed to 52-42 on September 30, 1988.
